Eagle Scholars is a four-year program designed for students with motivation, interest, aptitude and commitment toward a rigorous academic challenge with a focus on courses that will prepare students for majors in a STEM-related field.

Required Information

Students are required to submit the following information with their personal information to be considered for the program.

- Copy of complete 7th grade report card
- Copy of 8th grade report card (including quarter 3 grades)
- Copy of most recent MAP test scores (in all available areas)
- Copy of PASS test scores for science and/or social studies
- Copy of PSAT scores (if available)
- Copy of most recent SC Ready test results for ELA and math
- Confidential recommendation forms completed by two middle school teachers sent directly to Dr. Nancy Ungvarsky at Beaufort High School by interschool mail or delivered to the school in a sealed envelope signed by the teacher
- ➤ A copy of the student's IGP form for the 9th grade (if available)
- ➤ A 250-word essay on the assigned prompt (formatted according to the instructions and attached to application)

Who Should Apply?

The core curriculum that the students will be required to follow focuses on preparing students for college majors that will require students to take <u>advanced math and science classes</u>. The Eagle Scholars program is intended to provide the foundation that these students will need to be successful. Students will be ranked based on the standardized test scores, middle school grades, teacher recommendations, and essay that are submitted. The top 54 students who apply will be given a seat in the program. If there are more than 54 applicants, then the students who did not rank in the top 54 will be placed on a waiting list and will be placed in the program if a seat becomes available. We recommend that students who are applying to this program meet the following criteria; however, all applicants will be evaluated.

Grades of 85 or higher in Algebra 1, Geometry (if completed), 8th grade English or
English I (H) (if completed)
A score of 85 or higher on the Algebra 1 State EOC examination (if completed)
A score of 85 or higher on the English 1 State EOC examination (if completed)
A score in the 85 th percentile or higher in reading and math on 8 th grade MAP tests
A score of exemplary in at least on area of the PASS (science and/or social studies)
A score of exceeds expectations in the two areas tested by the SC Ready
A score of 1180 or higher on the PSAT (The college board predicts that 70% of students
who score at least 1180 will pass the AP Human Geography exam)

Essay Topic

All applicants are asked to compose a 250-word essay using the following prompt. All essays should be typed, using 12 pt. Times New Roman font and double spaced. Student responses will be evaluated on creativity, style, and grammar using the rubric provided with this application.

Choose a character that you admire from a book (fiction or nonfiction) that you have read. Describe the character traits you find admirable and explain why these traits deserve to be admired. Cite evidence from the text that shows how your character displayed the traits that you described.
